Carter has received 6 awards for his work. In April 2024, Carter won the Palladio Award in the Commercial Division for New Design & Construction of less than 30,000 square feet for St. Clare of Assisi Catholic Church in Charleston, SC. That Church will be one topic of today's webinar.

He has authored numerous articles in professional journals as well, but, most recently, he is listed among the "Recommended Architects and Artists of North America" in Michael S.
