Apologetics:

A defense or justification of a Christian teaching

Catechesis:

Teaching Christian doctrine to make disciples (CCC glossary)

Ecumenism:

Promotion of the restoration of unity among all Christians (CCC glossary)

We need to develop a culture of evangelism:

Page 51, Forming Intentional Disciples

Asked whether spreading the faith was a high priority of their parishes, <u>75 percent of conservative Protestant</u> congregations and <u>57 percent of African American</u> congregations responded affirmatively, whereas only <u>6 percent of Catholic parishes did the same.</u>

Asked whether they sponsored local evangelistic activities, <u>39 percent of conservative</u>

<u>Protestant</u> congregations and <u>16 percent of African-American</u> congregations responded positively as compared with only <u>3 percent of Catholic parishes</u>.

We need to develop a culture of evangelism:

CONFIRMATION: Jesus gave us an <u>entire sacrament</u> for the primary purpose of equipping us to be witnesses for Jesus.

1303 From this fact, Confirmation brings an increase and deepening of baptismal grace: - it gives us a special strength of the Holy Spirit to spread and <u>defend the faith by word and action</u> as true <u>witnesses of Christ</u>, to <u>confess the name of Christ boldly</u>, and <u>never to be ashamed</u> of the Cross:

1304 ... Confirmation ... is the sign that Jesus Christ has marked a Christian with the seal of his Spirit by clothing him with <u>power from on high</u> so that he <u>may be his witness</u>.

1305 This "character" perfects the common priesthood of the faithful, received in Baptism, and "the confirmed person receives the <u>power to profess faith in Christ publicly</u> and as it were officially."

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

Your question was about the Church and the Bible, not the Chruch and Christ



The next question is, since there is no table of contents in the New Testament, how did the Church know what books belonged in the New Testament?



Meaning, none of the books of the NT say, "Make sure to add these books in the Bible."



Along with that, a little history perspective is required. Until the canon of Scripture was finalized there were a number of different books that were considered Scripture and used as such, in addition to the current books in the NT.



Also, many of the NT books were disputed for a long time as to whether or not they should be considered Scripture.
